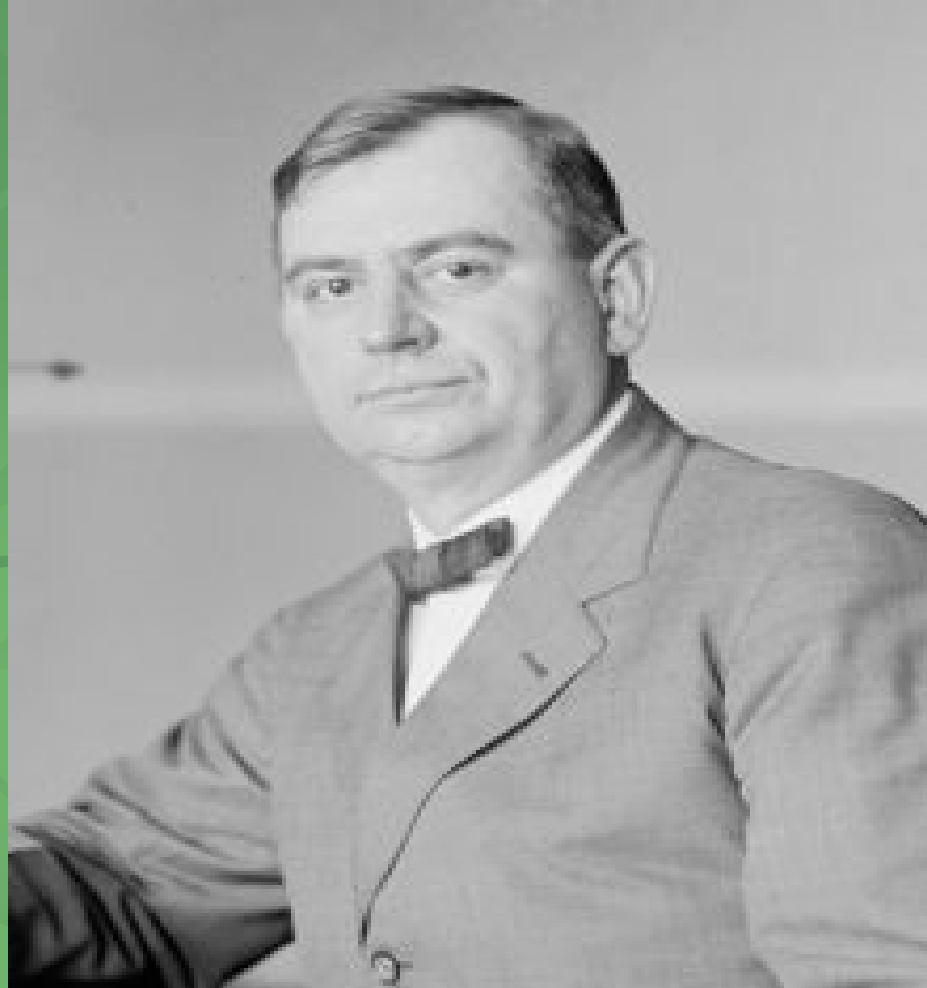

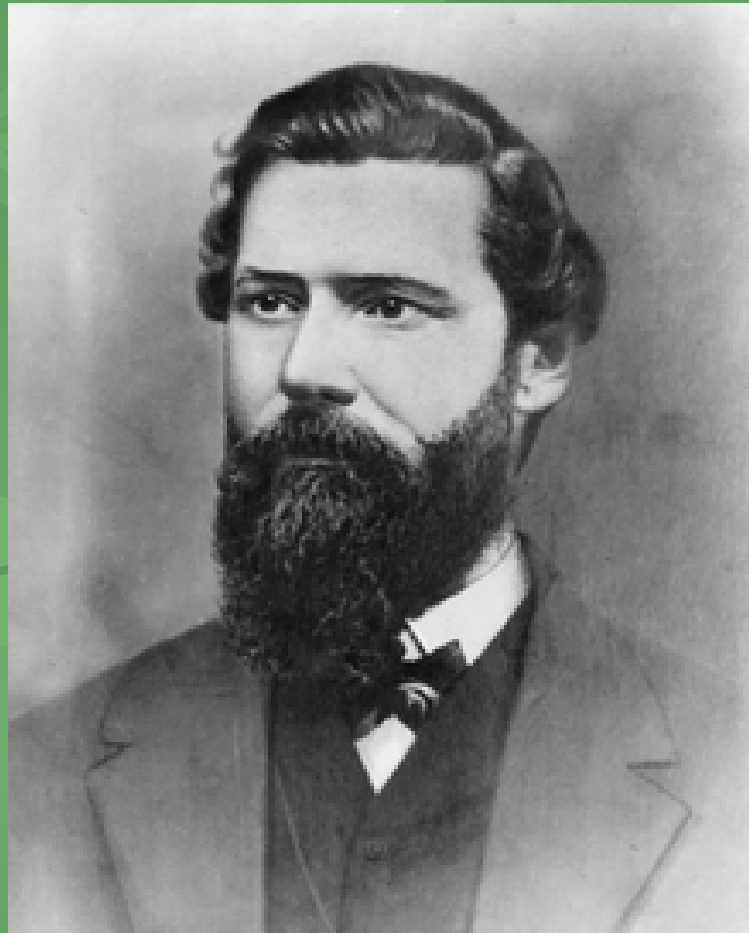

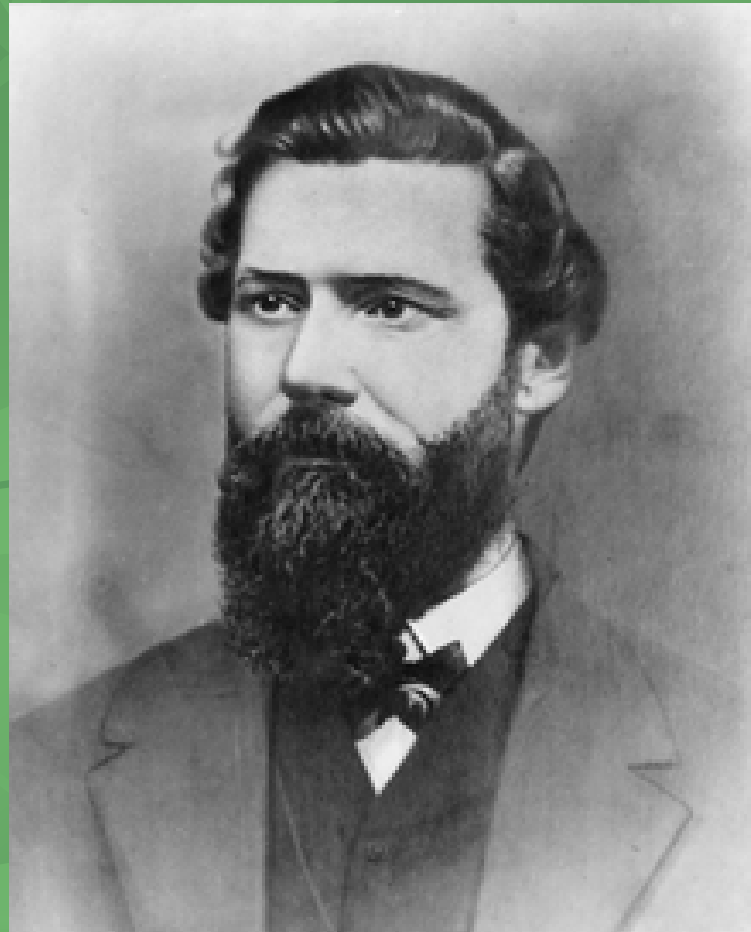

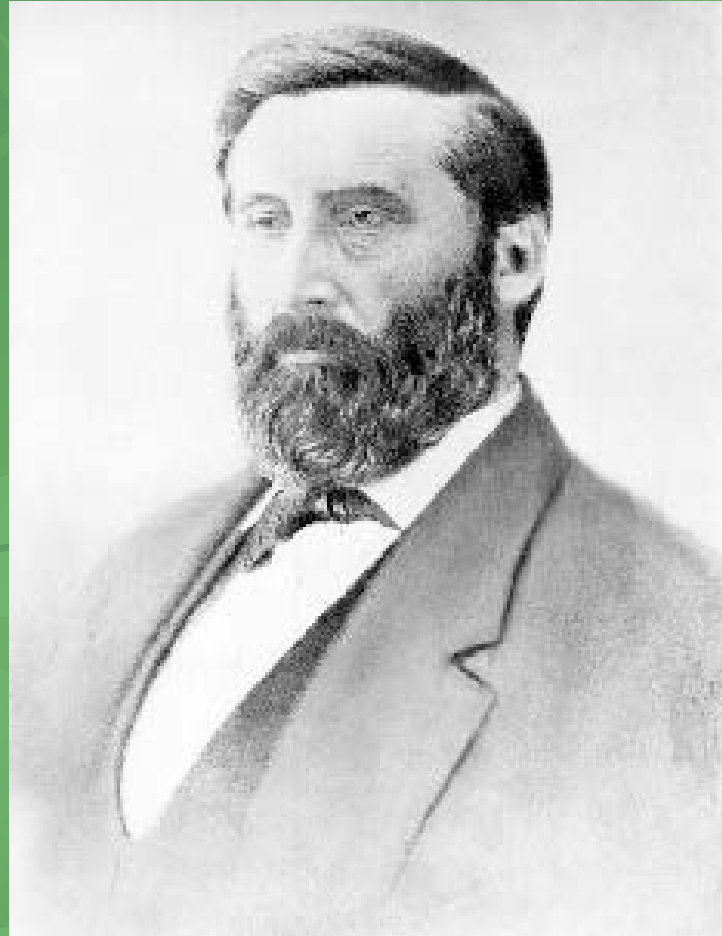

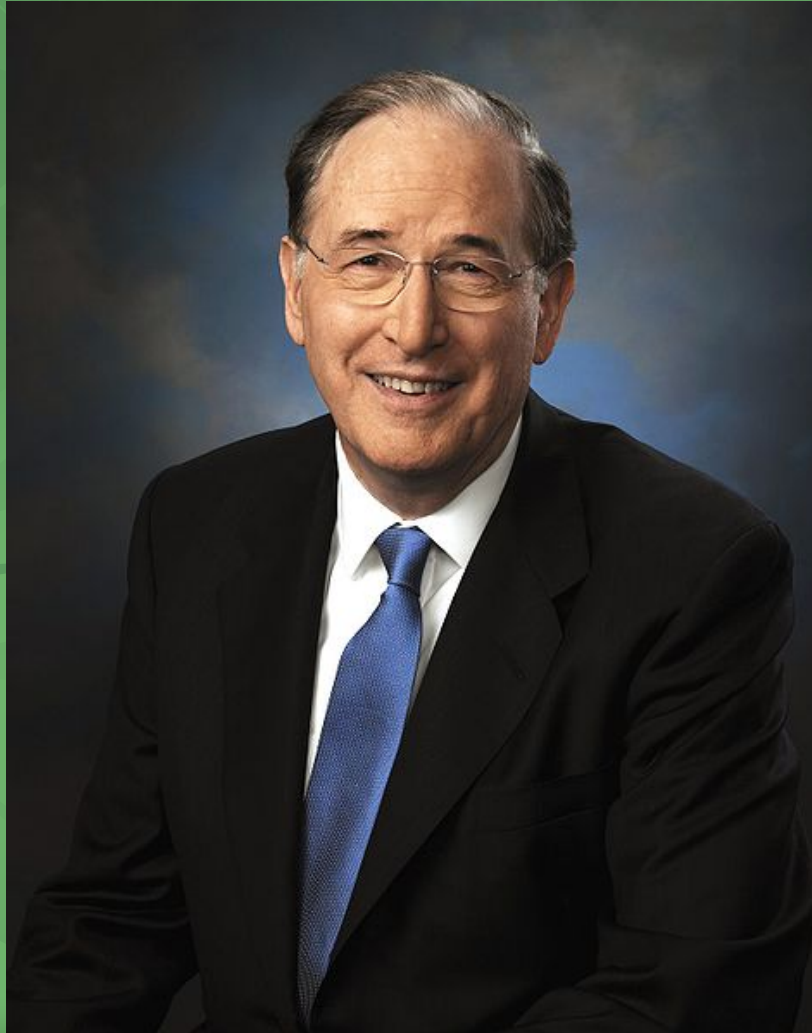

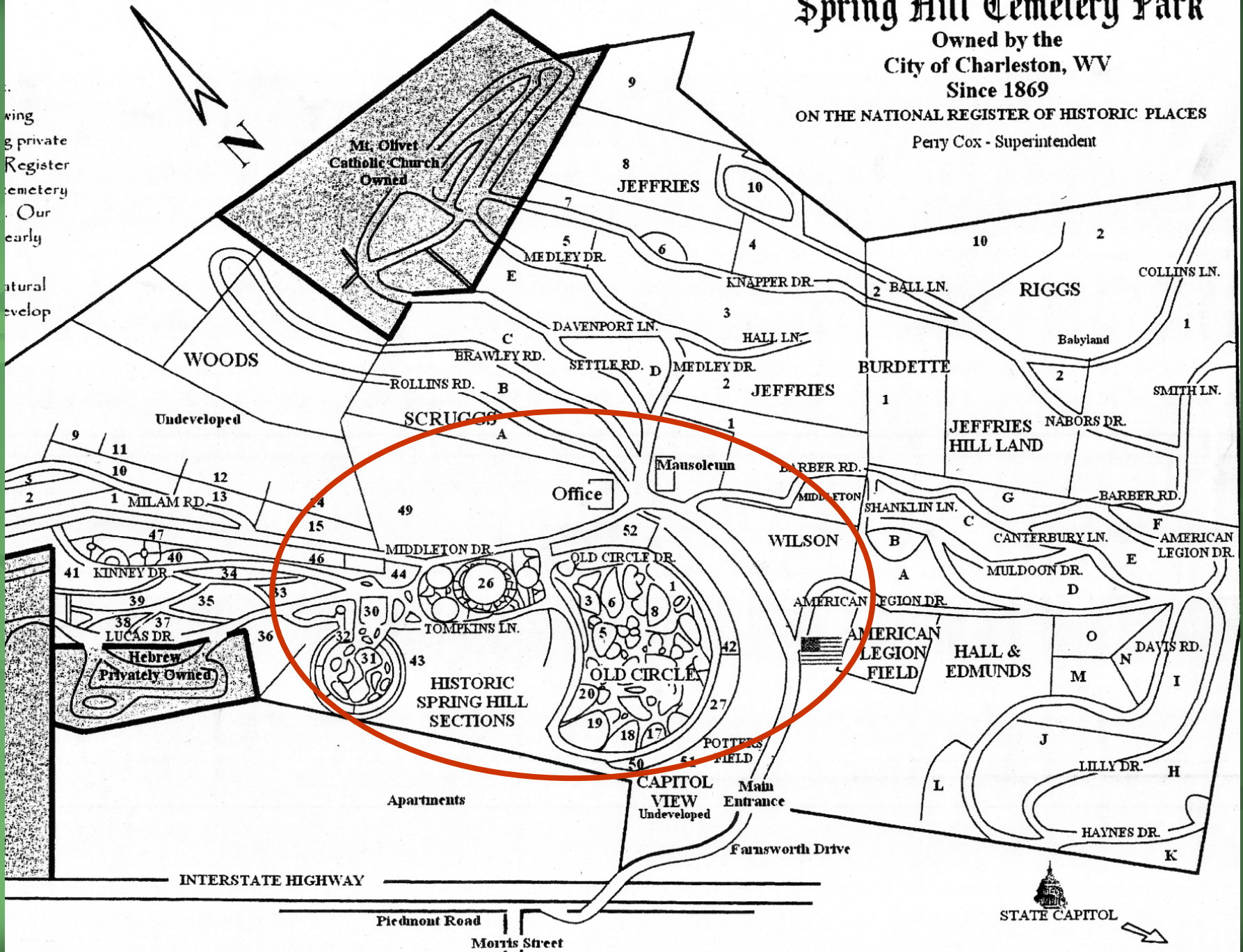

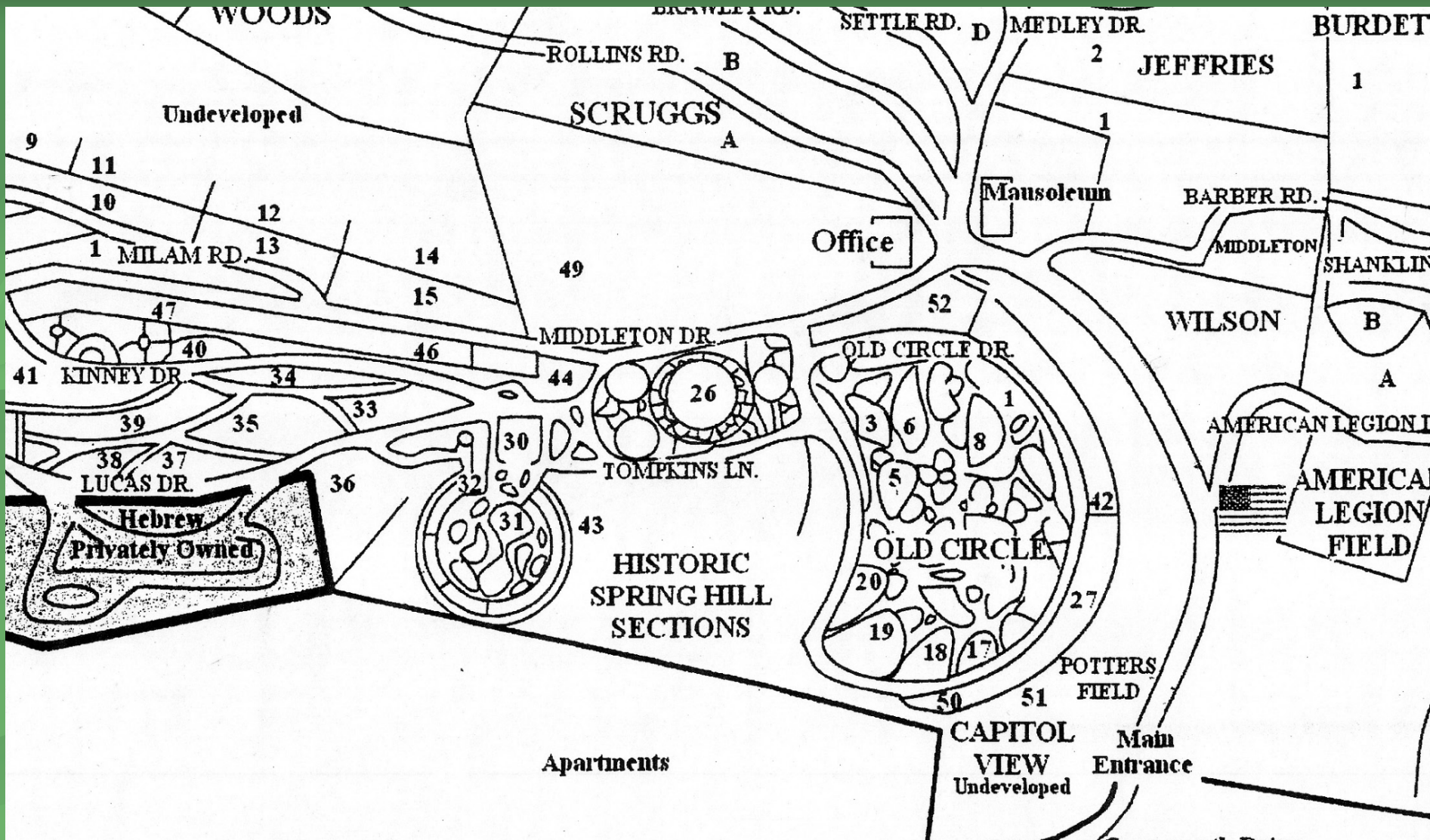

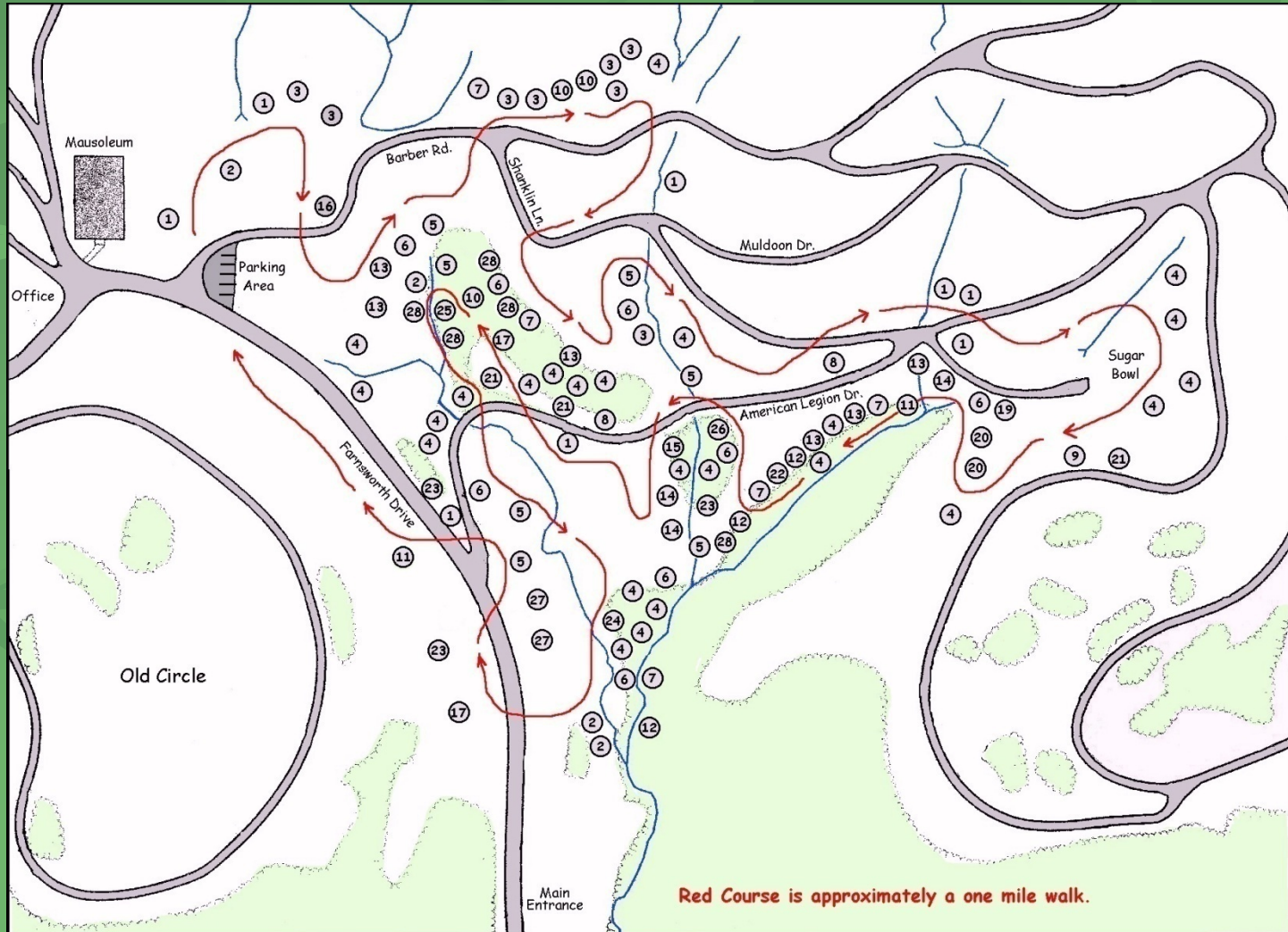

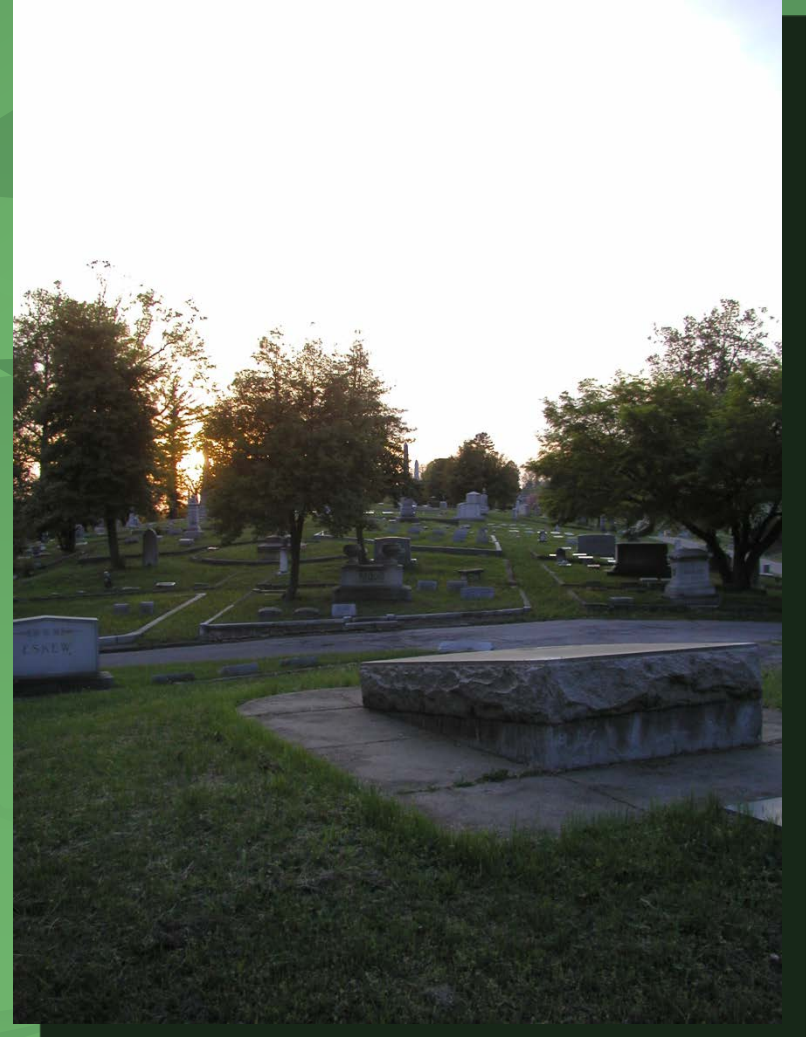

# Dr. John P. Hale—1824-1902



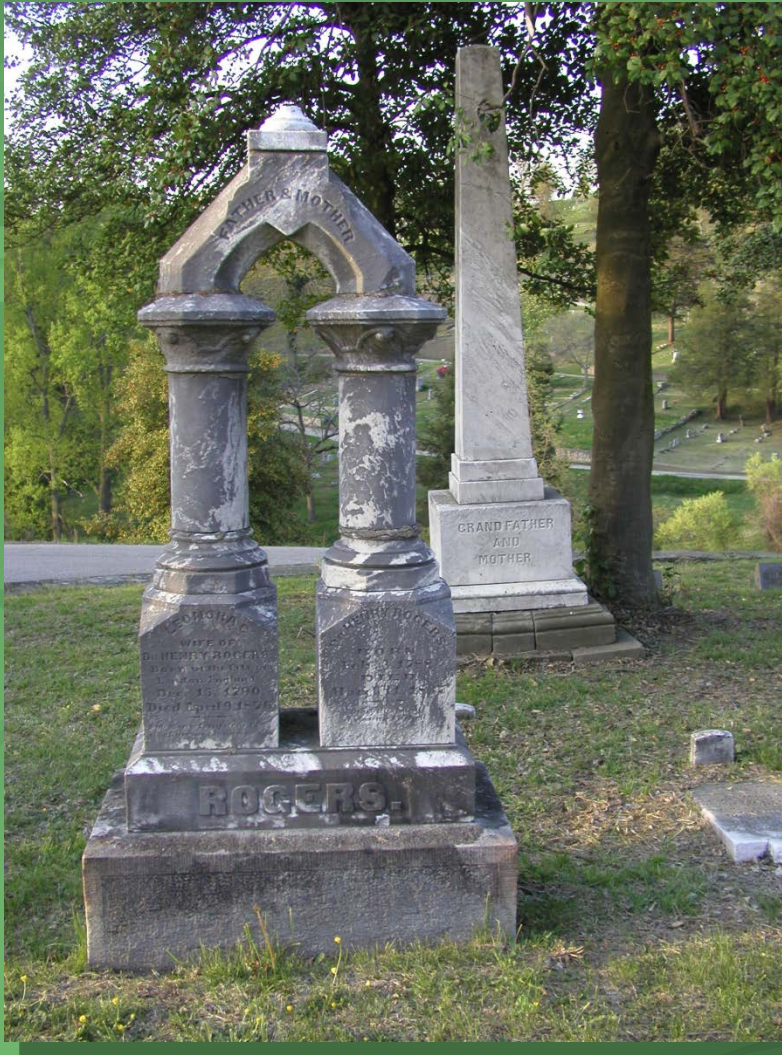
*Mary Ingles  
J. P. Hale*

- Mary Ingles' grt-grandson
- MD—U. Penn 1845
- Salt manufacture—1847
- Mayor of Charleston 1871-2
- First steam boats on Kanawha
- First gas company
- First brick street in America—in Charleston, 1870!

# Dr. John P. Hale

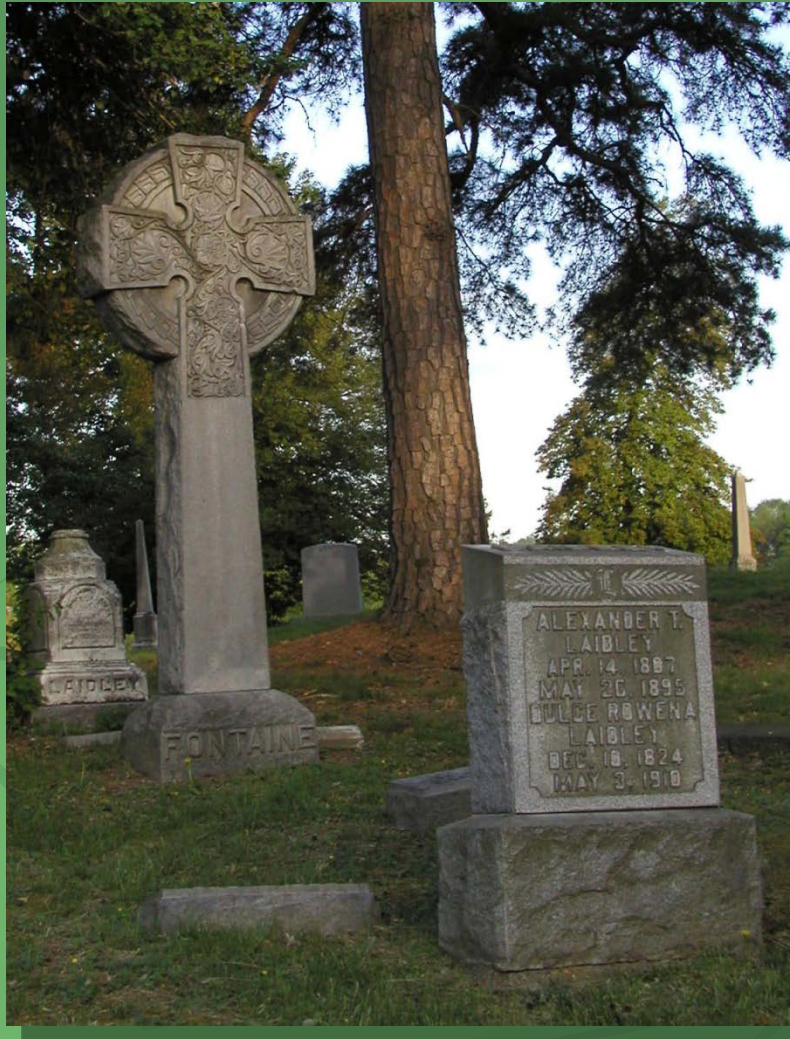
- President of first daily newspaper in Charleston—1871
- Built first theater in Charleston—1871
- First public delivery of ice—1871
- Established Charleston's first steam laundry—1871
- Opened barrel making factory 1872—made 1000 barrels/day 
- Shipped his salt in his barrels on his steam packets—1878
- Led formation of Salt Trust, the first trust in US
- First wholesale grocery in the valley—1872
- Donated the money to build the Capitol at Charleston—1871
- Introduced the English sparrow to the US!

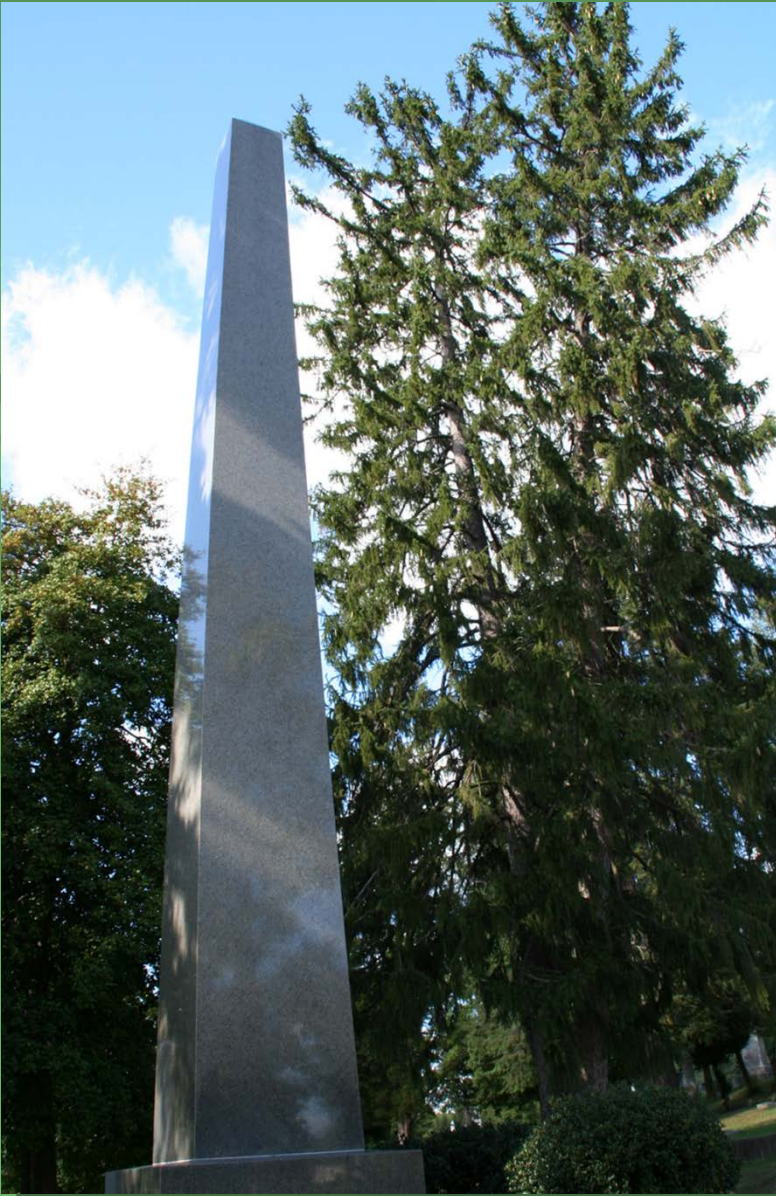
# Jimmy Clark Welch

- Killed at Battle of Scary Creek, Spring 1861
- Battle fought to seize salt



# Judge James Brown

- State Supreme Court Justice
- Granite Obelisk
- Largest in the Park
- 35 Tons—30+ft
- 24 Mules dragged it up the hill



# Mary Watkins Mausoleum



- Wife of Andrew Watkins
- After serious steamboating accident, went into the grocery business

# Moses Frankenger (1834-1902)

- Born Bavaria—arrived New York by sailing ship 1851
- Opened Frankenger's Department Store before Civil War
- Lost fortune and was POW for siding with the Union
- Resumed success after the war

# Dr. Spicer Patrick



- From New York, came to Kanawha 1816 to practice medicine
- A mentor of Dr. Hale
- First Speaker of the House for new state of West Va.

- Cypress tree planted as a small ornament the person dies, but the tree keeps growing

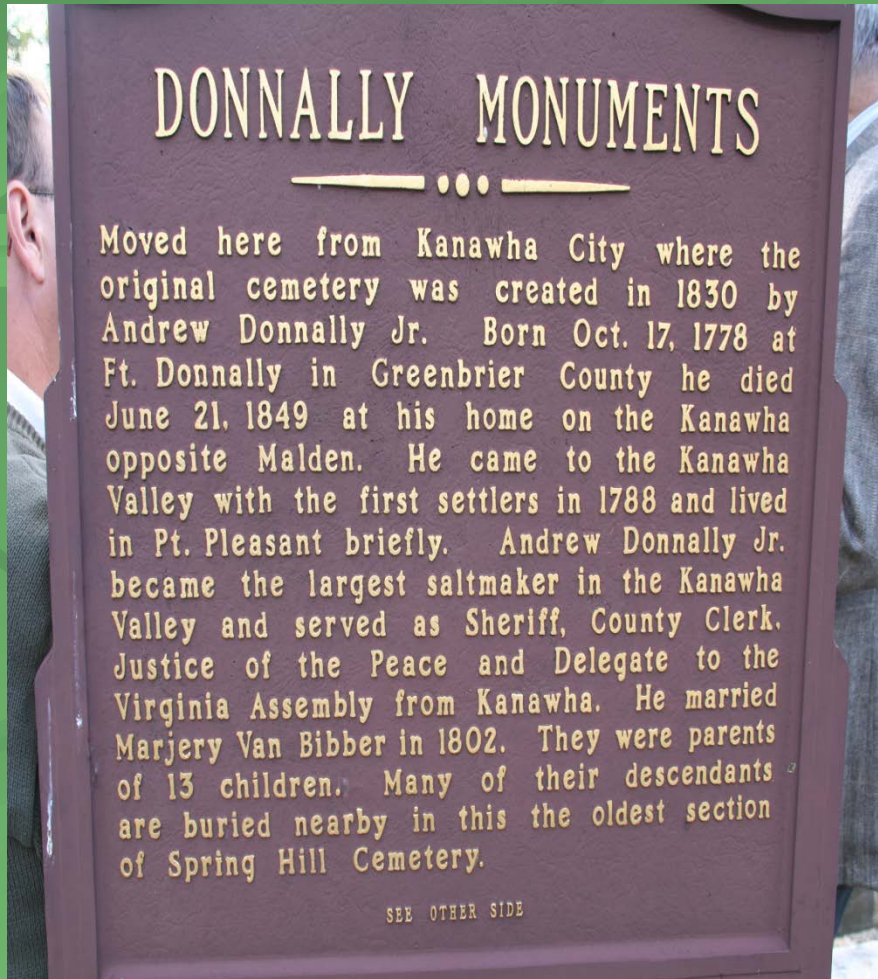

# The Donnally Family



# Andrew Donnally, Jr.

- Born at Ft. Donnally, Greenbrier County, 1778
- One of the earliest pioneers in the valley, 1788
- The largest saltmaker in the Kanawha Valley
- Multiple offices in government



# George Summers Laidley

- Superintendant of Charleston schools 1878-1922
- Principal of first high school, Union School, 1876
- Instrumental in founding of Ka. Public Library
- Namesake Laidley Field



# Col. John Clarkson



- Vigorous secessionist
- Known as extremely brave, wounded 3 times in battle
- Put in charge of salt works for Confederacy due to successful blockade



## Col. Alexander Quarrier

- Commanded a Company in the Revolutionary War
- Moved to Charleston from Richmond, 1811
- Descendants married many of the members of other prominent families in the area
- His Malden land held the early gas springs known as Burning Springs Tract

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# Joseph Ruffner Family

- Helped start the salt industry
- Henry (1790-1861) a founder of the first Presbyterian church in valley
- Was President of W&L
- Joel and wife Viola taught Booker T. Washington
- “Holly Grove” next to Governor’s Mansion



# Rachel Grant Tompkins



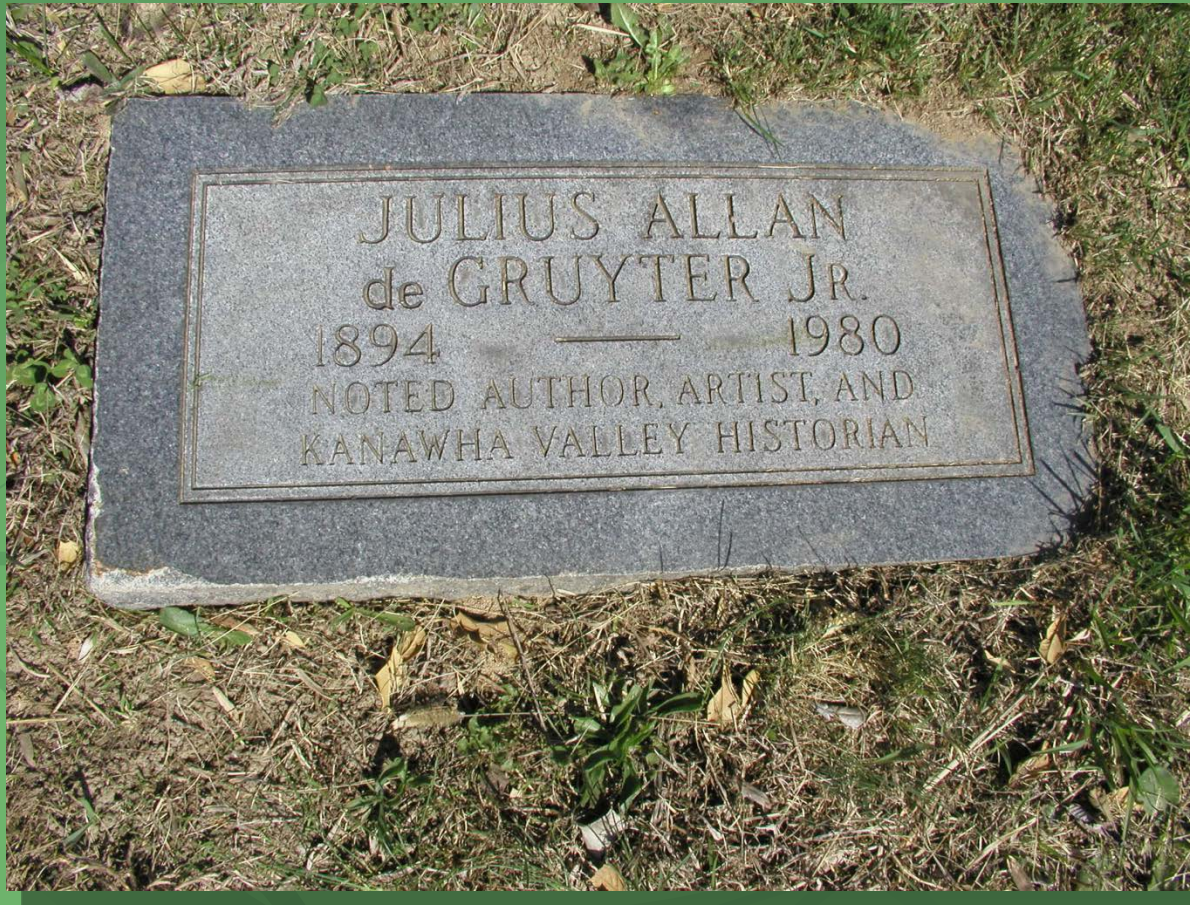
- Aunt of General (later President) Ulysses S. Grant
- Saved her house, “Cedar Grove,” from Union burning by informing soldiers who her nephew was

# Joseph Dickinson Family



- Prominent Kanawha family
- Largest salt producers prior to Civil War
- John Quincy D. founder of Kanawha Valley Bank
- Mayor Danny Jones' grandmother a Dickinson

# John Appleton



- Major from Boston, MA
- Recruited African-American soldiers for the 54<sup>th</sup> Regiment under Col. Robt. Gould Shaw, made famous in the movie “Glory”
- Came to Charleston to look for work
- Gored to death by a bull in his 80’s

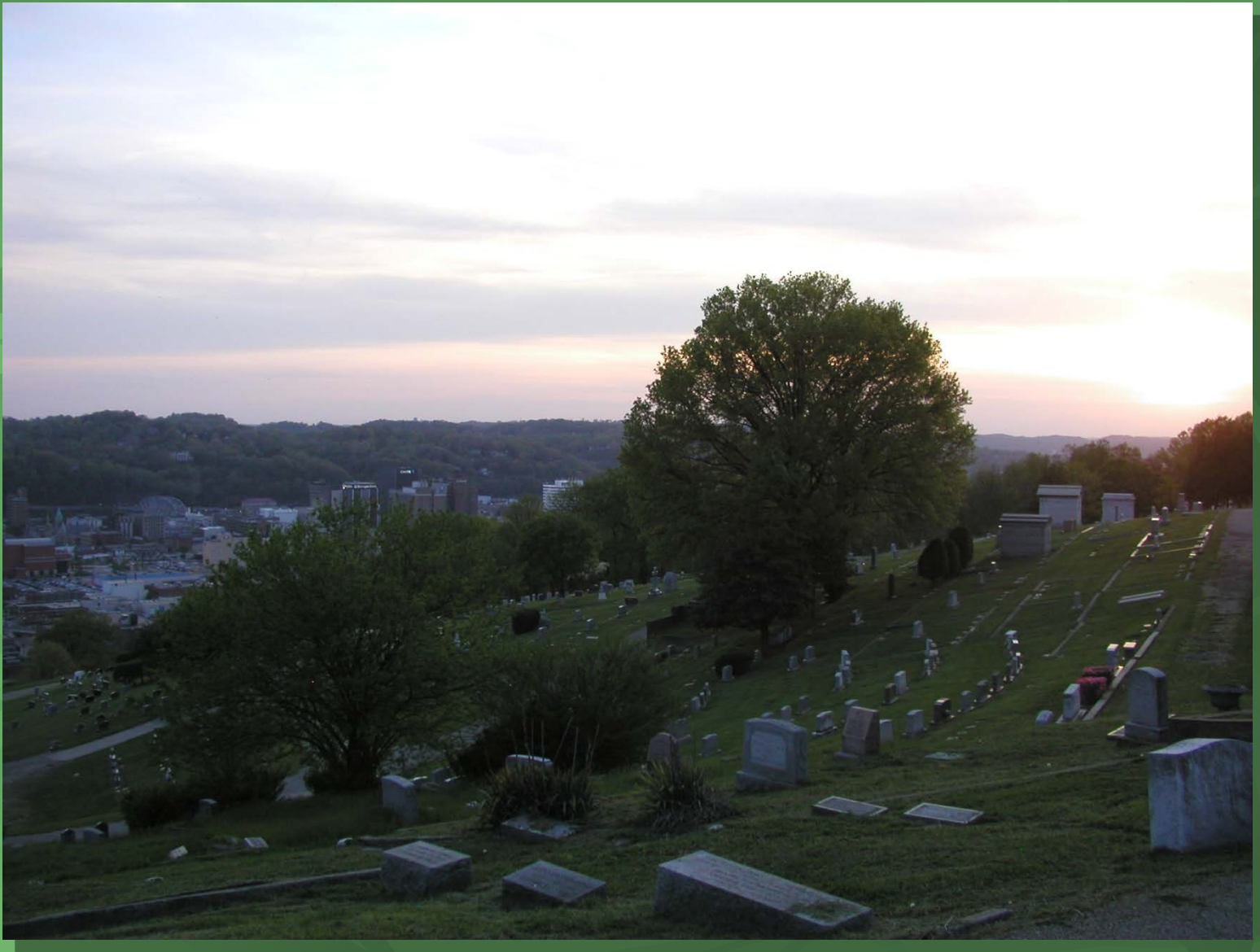

- Neoclassical architecture



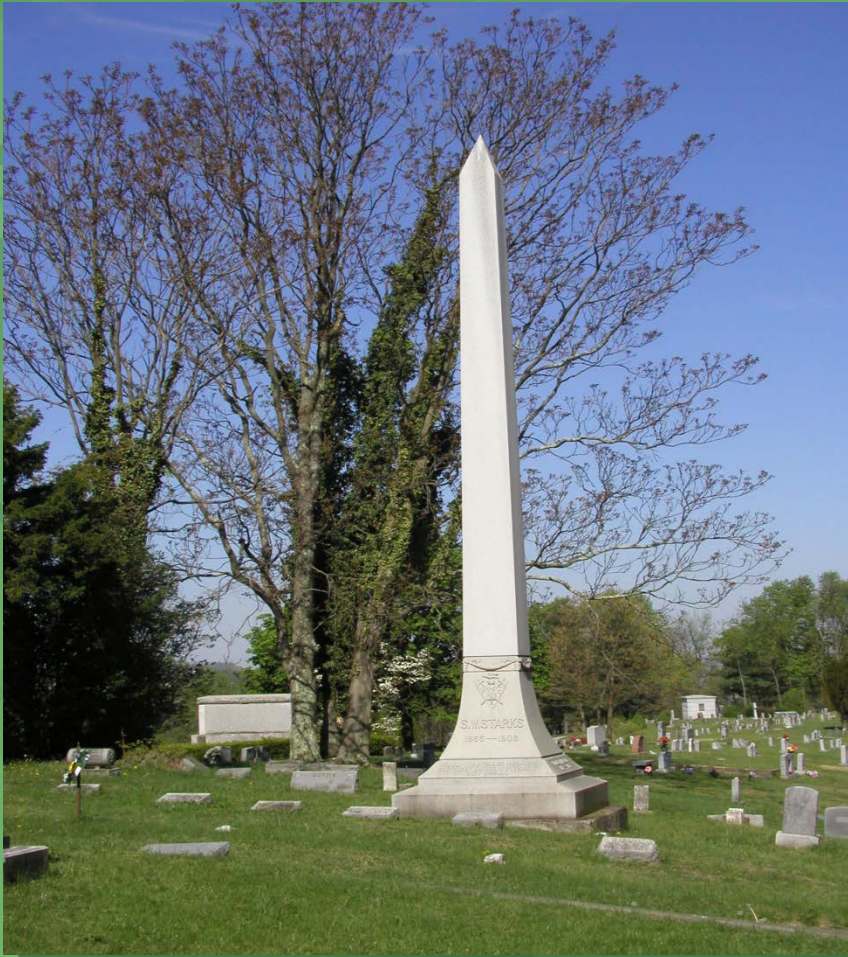

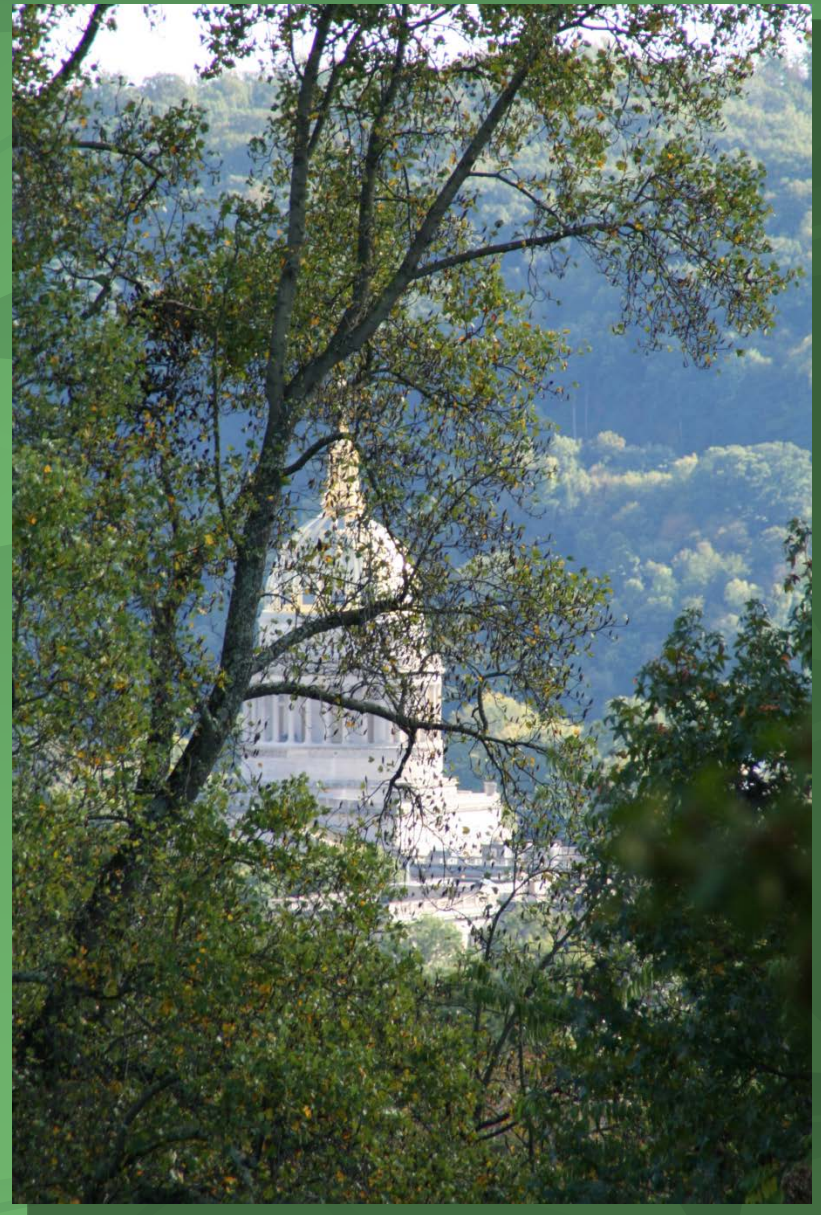


- Prominent African-American leader
